Concerns

- Pornography is now the most prominent sexuality educator for many young people.
- Most young people discover porn well before they encounter sex perhaps even before they have kissed or held a partner.
- Pornography may lead to aggressive behaviours

What's in bestselling pornography videos

High levels of aggression in pornography in both verbal and physical forms.


Of the 304 scenes analysed, 88.2% contained physical aggression, principally spanking, gagging, and slapping


48.7% of scenes contained verbal aggression, primarily name-calling.


Perpetrators of aggression were usually male, whereas targets of aggression were overwhelmingly female.

Targets most often showed pleasure or responded neutrally to the aggression.

Mainstreaming of pornography













Differences between boys and girls



Boys:

Feel more positive about online porn

Are less likely to see online porn as exploitative, degrading or humiliating.




Girls:

Feel more negative about online porn


Are worried about how boys who have seen porn will see girls and how they would expect girls to behave sexually.


How do young people feel when they see porn online?






Encounters with online pornography, attitudes towards age verification and age restriction.


- 15-minute online survey with young Australians aged 16-18 years.
- A total of 1,004 young people participated in the survey.




+Have you ever seen online pornography?




+How old were you when you saw online pornography for the first time?

"For biology GCSE we had to know about vaginal intercourse. It didn't talk about gay sex. I had never had any education on gay male sex or gay female sex. I didn't actually find out until I was 14 how gay men had sex and I was like – ooohhh." (18 year old)

Adults are generally terrified of talking to young people about porn. Your parents have had you from a baby and they want to hold on to that innocent version of you." (16 year old)

Findings

Children as young as six are encountering pornography


For nine- to 11-year-olds, exposure to pornography is frequent

Teenagers are learning more from pornography than sex education classes

For young people exploring their sexuality, pornography can end up filling gaps in their education

...findings

- + Pornography is confusing the issue of consent
- + Pornography use doesn't always conform to gender stereotypes
- + For many young people, pornography is their introduction to sex
- + Pornography is stopping young people from connecting in the real world
